The United Methodist Church has been in the news lately, and not always for the most positive reasons. Our new bishop, Rev. Dr. Karen Oliveto, has been in the headlines as the first openly gay, married bishop. There is talk of schism both on the part of the conservatives and the liberal; many moderates are not sure what this will mean for them or for the future of the church. I can't tell you what the future holds for our denomination, but I pray it continues. I have been a Methodist all of my life, and trace Methodist roots back several generations on both sides of my family. There are many aspects of Methodism that I continue to embrace, and some I don't agree with, but I realize without understanding our history, our beliefs, and our structure, we can't fully enter into the discussion. It is important to understand what it means to be a United Methodist and how Methodism fits within Christianity.

On September 11, we will use scripture to understand some of the basics of Methodist faith over six weeks. We will begin looking at our history, look into something called the quadrilateral, understand the Methodist understanding of the sacraments, look at some of our social principles, and end with a discussion of one of the most important Methodist thoughts: grace.

John Wesley, the founder of the Methodist movement, wrote, "I am not afraid that the people called Methodists should ever cease to exist either in Europe or America. But I am afraid lest they should only exist as a dead sect, having the form of religion without the power. And this undoubtedly will be the case unless they hold fast the doctrine, spirit, and discipline with which they first set out" (*Thoughts Upon Methodism*, 1786). We cannot hold fast to these unless we understand what they are.



Ride Free Longmont

As a denomination, United Methodists have a rich heritage of social justice ministry. John Wesley was in the streets of London preaching and teaching and he was also found in the jails and orphanages, working with those on the margins, changing the wrongs to rights. We also know that Jesus commands us to love our neighbors.

Over the next several weeks the Longmont City Council will be reviewing all departments' budgets to establish a 2017 budget for the City of Longmont. I invite you to join me to work to keep "Ride Free Longmont" free for another year. Ride Free Longmont began 2½ years ago with a cooperative effort between RTD, Boulder County Transportation Department, and the City of Longmont to improve bus ridership in Longmont. Before Ride Free Longmont there were empty buses and empty bus stops. Now there are full buses and people waiting at the stops. Current funding from RTD and Boulder County will end December 31, 2016. The City of Longmont has the opportunity to renew the contract for 2017 with RTD for \$275,000 which amounts to less than fifty cents per trip. This would allow local RTD buses to remain free for everyone.

Many of the trips are being made by our poorest, most vulnerable members of our community. Free bus fare has allowed people on limited income, seniors, disabled, and low income wage earners to get to work, to medical appointments, grocery stores, library and more. We know that transportation is a basic need just like housing and food. **Ride Free Longmont** would allow people on the margins, including families with children, to save money that could be used for other aspects of life. At the OUR Center we are seeing more families not able to meet their basic financial needs. Paying \$5.20 per round trip per person will add a burden on their already tight budgets.

79% of the current bus riders in Longmont make less than \$35,000 per year. Many people on limited incomes do not have the luxury of owning a car. They are transit dependent. Through the Longmont Town Hall telephone meetings and Envision Longmont I learned that 42% of the residents of Longmont are interested in ways of improving alternative modes of transportation. **Ride Free Longmont** is an excellent way and, it works.

I spoke to the Longmont City Council on Tuesday, August 9, asking them to continue to fund **Ride Free Longmont** into 2017 and you could do the same. Writing to City Council or writing an editorial for the Times Call newspaper are excellent ways to do social justice ministry. I have plenty of facts and figures I can supply you if you are interested in having your voice heard to benefit our neighbors who struggle to keep a roof over their heads and food on their tables.

YOUNGADULT I found this quote to ring very true in understanding God and our relationship with God. Despite quite a lengthy search for context, I could not find the source of this quote by Richard Grant.

Unfortunately I do not know, with any real certainty, what Grant was trying to convey to his readers. I often prefer to not quote someone unless I know the intended message from the author. In seminary, it is a rudimentary teaching to not use a verse of scripture solely to prove a point. You should instead reference the greater passage related to the verse and explain the historical context. Otherwise you run the risk of proof-texting, the practice of using isolated, out-of-context quotations from a document to establish an argument in exegesis. It's a theological no-no! If you find the source, please let me know. I love reading and understanding the perspective of others. Please offer me some grace if I misplace the context here. In the meantime, however, I feel that in this case I may be pretty safe to use Grant's words to set our compass toward the reign and the Kingdom of God. I am certain that whether or not in context, the quote above is easily applied to our identity in Christ.

The focus of youth group this year (during our typical youth group gatherings, when we aren't serving others or participating in fun/fellowship opportunities) is on our identity in Jesus Christ. Throughout the school year, the youth will explore what it means to have their identity in Christ. A few examples are: I am a child of God (John 1:12), I am a friend of Jesus (John 15:15), I am justified and redeemed (Romans 3:24). Fear not, we will explore the greater passage to understand our identity- remember, no prooftexting. It is my goal to usher the youth toward an understanding of their purpose by understanding their identity in Christ. When we know "who" we are, we then become familiar with "why" we are.

In the midst of puberty and maturing (physically, cognitively, socially, emotionally, and spiritually), youth are always seeking their identity and their purpose. Teenagers are suddenly able to

think abstractly about ideas and about the world around them. Sometimes quite abruptly, the world ceases to be all about ourselves anymore, despite our greatest efforts to hold onto our child-hood ideas of our significance.

Note, our great efforts to hold onto control of the world (as we know it, at least) can be exhibited in a teenager's goofiness, an outburst of emotion that doesn't seem to fit the situation. Through our realization that we aren't the center of the universe, we begin to wonder who we really are and why we exist. That is why it is so important that young people are reminded of their identity, their value, their purpose. It is our task as caring adults in the church to teach our young people and to reinforce over and over again how much God loves us all.


Ladies Bible Study
