Happy Fall LPUMC Family!

It's hard to believe that the leaves are already turning and the days growing cooler, it seems to me that we just celebrated Memorial Day! Where has the time gone? As we have returned to our fall program schedule, a number of you have reached out to me to share your thoughts on our worship services. Thank you for doing this, I honestly appreciate your feedback. The feedback varies, so I would like to share with you some of what I am hearing, as well as some of the parameters that are being taken into consideration.

Since this past Spring, the staff, worship committee, and church council have received some comments that LPUMC should go to one service on Sunday morning year-round. The rationale behind this suggestion is that LPUMC would consistently have a full sanctuary. Some of the benefits to this option are that it would reduce the workload of staff, and volunteers who are involved in worship and the fellowship time. Another benefit is that everyone in the church gets to know each other, rather than seemingly feeling like there are two separate congregations. Admittedly, there is a greater sense of energy when the whole community of faith is gathered together, praising GOD in one space.

Now when we take into consideration the worship time and style, this is where the conversation gets a bit trickier. In consideration of what time a service should be held, I have received some comments that some prefer an earlier service time so that they may worship and then get on with other weekend activities. Others have shared that it is harder to get to church earlier so they prefer a later start time. In regards to worship style there are even more varying views around music, and rightfully so as music itself is a form of worship and a meaningful connection to GOD. I have received a full spectrum of views on praise music versus hymns. Even within the traditional service format, there is much opinion between hymns from the Red Hymnal vs. the black *Faith We Sing*. While on the topic of hymn selection, the staff tries to vary hymns based on sermon theme as well as including the old favorites. Both Parker and I want to ensure that we get your favorite hymns in the rotation so shoot us a list of the hymns or songs you would like to hear!

Pastor's Pen (cont.)

Here are a few final thoughts on the matter. Those who study church trends suggest that if the sanctuary is more than 75% full, a visitor who has to search for a seat is less likely to return. This makes sense, as none of us like to attend a movie theater that is packed because we all like to have a little space around us. Another consideration is that the two services offer options, whereas a blended service tends to leave everyone having to accept more compromises. A final point that LPUMC leadership wants to continue to seriously consider, is whether moving to one service is one more step towards the overall decline in the health of the church. Again, folks who study church trends share that once a service is ended it is pretty much gone from the equation as it's much harder to start a new service. As United Methodists, we have experienced this by experimenting with Saturday night, midweek, or early Sunday morning prayer services. These tend to eek along with a handful of folks until it fizzles out.

Friends, though the world has largely returned to "normal" in the wake of the pandemic, we remain in uncharted waters. While we have known all along that mainline congregations have been in steady decline, the pandemic has exponentially accelerated the issue. As such, we are at a time in the life of the church in which we need to lean into each other more than ever. The church is only as strong as we make it together and so I thank you for your concerns and feedback. I ask for your grace and patience as we continue to navigate this conversation with careful discernment. I am deeply blessed to be associated with you as the most vibrant United Methodist Church in the St. Vrain Circuit. Thank you for being a great church!


Mountain View Elementary (MVES) Teacher Meals October 9-11

Reference:

Relationships:

Spiritual:
